Jesus knew his apostles well. He knew some felt shame and remorse for having denied and abandoned him. However. His sign of peace let them know that they were forgiven and that He still loved them. Divine Savior Our continues to offer Himself

in peace and forgiveness to us all.

How can we find this peace in Christ? What if you have doubts? What if you're angry? What if life has been challenging, and things don't seem fair? What if you feel abandoned and God doesn't seem to be answering your prayers? What if you feel guilty because of sin and mistakes? Christ's peace and unconditional love are offered to all, especially to you.

First, ask the Holy Spirit to open your heart and tell him in your own words that you need Jesus and want Him to help. "Apart from me, you can't do anything," says the Lord (Jn. 15:5). Then, read the Bible, go to Confession, and nourish your soul with Holy Communion.

Prayer is another crucial element in reaching interior peace, as it raises your mind and heart to God in a relationship of love, trust, and peace. God wants to hear from you! He wants to hear about your praise, thankfulness, frustrations, anger, worries, needs, and repentance.

Many people begin with standard memorized prayers and then move into more honest, intimate conversations. Meditative prayer can be fruitful as well, like praying with Scripture,



spiritual books, or the Rosary.

To hear back from God, we must listen. Begin by letting go of all the busy conversation and spiritual reading and just sit silently in love and total surrender with our Lord. The goal is to bask

in His glory, trusting His holy will in all things.

Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta once said, "The fruit of silence is prayer. The fruit of prayer is faith. The fruit of faith is love. The fruit of love is service. The fruit of service is peace." May the peace of our Lord be with you always.

- **†** What matters are troubling you that you can bring to prayer?
- As Christ displayed patience with the disciples' lack of understanding and unbelief, how has he been patient with you? How are you patient with others?
- How does the virtue of forgiveness lead to peace?
- How has Christ's resurrection made a difference in your life? Since Jesus calls us to do so, how can we share the literal truth of the Resurrection, and how can we witness this in our lives?

Faith Formation News

April 14, 2024 Third Sunday of Easter

"Why are you troubled? And why do questions

arise in your hearts? Look at My hands and My feet, that it is I myself. Touch me and see......" Opening Our Minds to Jesus

By baptism we are grafted onto Christ so as to form with him one single body-his Mystical Body. We are given life by his very Spirit. His divine sentiments enter into us in ever-increasing measure, in proportion as we strip ourselves of our own. That is how we receive the adoption of the sons of God, by means of the pouring into our souls of the Holy Spirit, who by his gift of piety moves us to address Almighty God by the sweet name of Father, and to serve him, love him, and honor him, praying in the manner we ought. Thus he dwells in us, not only sealing us with the living image of Christ, whose features he imprints upon us, but also anointing us and illuminating us with the gentleness, sweetness, and splendor of his grace We receive him as the fount of living water that, by divine impulse or instinct, makes us rush forward toward eternal life.... All our good consists, then, in cleaving to God until we have become one spirit with him, in being truly docile and attentive to him, interiorly recollected that we may catch every sound of his voice, and desiring faithfully to accomplish that which the Lord our God deigns to speak within us, for he speaks words of peace to his saints and to all those who are converted to the heart....In order, then, to understand the stages that this divine life offers from the time it is received in baptism until it is fully unfolded in glory, it is essential to keep well before the mind all the mysteries-joyful, sorrowful, and glorious-of the life of our Lord. To that end, it is good that we should meditate on them deeply at the side of Mary, Mother of Divine Grace, in the holy rosary; for all of them-from the Incarnation itself and the birth of Christ to his Passion, Death, and Resurrection and the sending of the same divine Spirit, in which the marvels of the Christian life are consummated-have to be reproduced, each in its own way, as in so many other Christs, in all perfect Christians. Servant of God Juan G. Arintero, o.p. (Father Arintero († 1928) was a Spanish Dominican priest, theologian, author, and highly regarded spiritual director.)

VIA LUCIS, The Paschal Way of the Light



The Via Lucis, or the "Way of Light" in Latin, is a Catholic devotion also known as the Stations of the Resurrection. In these

Stations, we meditate on Christ's Resurrection and the incredible events that followed, until He sent the Holy Spirit to us at Pentecost. Christians have meditated privately on these events since the 1st Century, before a formal devotion existed. In 1988, Fr. Sabino Palumbieri, a Professor of Anthropology at the Salesian University in Rome, gathered them together and suggested them for the faithful. The Holy See promulgated them in 1990. The Stations of the Resurrection emphasize the glory, hope, and certitude of our redemption, the most central event in our Christian faith. As with the Stations of the Cross, different versions exist. Some include only readings or meditations for each Station, and some take the form of a Scripture reading, a short meditation, and a prayer. During this Easter Season, Walk the Stations "Way of Light" and meditate on them until PENTECOST which we will celebrate on May 19, Sunday.
