TWENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Jeremiah 38:4-6, 8-10

Jeremiah urged the people of Jerusalem to surrender to the enemy. This angered the princes, who then requested that Jeremiah be put to death. The king allowed the princes to leave him in a cistern without food or water. But after Ebed Melech pleaded for Jeremiah's life, the king decided to free him.

Second Reading: Hebrews 12:1-4

This letter to the Hebrews inspires all Christians to persevere, in spite of the trials they may face. Jesus endured much suffering and was rewarded by God. Despite our struggles, we must remember Jesus' ability to endure and maintain strong faith in him.

Gospel: Luke 12:49-53

Jesus tells his disciples that his message will not bring peace to the earth. Instead, even families will become sharply divided because some members will embrace him, while others condemn him.

The author describes sin as something clinging to us - like barnacles on a boat. We need to shed them to be free in running the race. We can anticipate the joy which lies before us, especially when we can share it with another person.



August 17, 2025 - 20th Sunday in Ordinary

"I have come to set the earth on fire."

Pope Benedict XVI wrote that the fire is Christ's own Passion of love, "a fire that is to be handed on. Whoever comes close to him must be prepared to be burned. This is a fire that makes things bright and pure and free and grand. Being a Christian, then, is daring to entrust oneself to this burning fire." The fire is set ablaze when we speak the truth, like the Prophet Jeremiah, who is punished for it. Christ comes to divide us from whatever keeps us from him, to rid us of every burden and sin that clings to us. We keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, waiting for him, trusting that he will put a new song of praise into our mouth. (Magnificat)

AUGUST 22, QUEENSHIPof MARY



"So Mary is a Queen. And, for our consolation, we ought to remember that she is a most tender and kind Queen, eager to help us in our miseries. So much so that the Church wants us to call her in this prayer a Queen of Mercy. Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy!" -St. Alphonsus Liguori

The Blessed Virgin Mary has been crowned Queen in virtue of the Lord Jesus Christ. her Son, who is the King of the universe. In heaven as on earth, she points the way not

to her own glory but to His, with which she has been robed and which she seeks only to reflect. Mary is our Queen because she is the Mother of Jesus, the King of kings. Saint Maximilian Kolbe wrote that Mary "has a right to be loved as Queen of all hearts so that through her, hearts would be cleansed and themselves become immaculate, similar and like unto her own heart, and so worthy of union with God." The Queenship of Mary shows us that being united to Jesus gives us a royal citizenship, participation in a heavenly court. We have a King and a Queen whose greatness does not distance them from us. They are closer, more loving, and more intimately attentive than anyone else to us. (Magnificat)

Jubilee 2025: Pilgrims of Hope The Mountain of the Lord



Every morning on the bus ride to my high school I would see Mount Greylock. Grevlock is the highest peak in Massachusetts, and for a brief window of time, every morning, it would swing into view. Framed between two

lower ridges, the peak rose to the sky, sometimes hidden in fog, sometimes gleaming in the sun. (Looking at the same mountain many years before me, Herman Melville thought its snowy summit looked like the back of a white whale—and Moby Dick was born.) Mount Greylock isn't only good for looking at. It also offers great hiking, and I spent many happy hours on its trails. There are various routes to the top of Mount Greylock, each with its difficulties, each with its charms. You can meander up alongside a brook or weave your way up

steep switchbacks. You can take on a near-vertical old ski trail. Each route, however, has the same destination—the summit with its cool air, its lookout tower, and that feeling of standing just below the sky. When I gazed up at that mountain every morning on the way to school, I couldn't help but hope for the next time I'd be able to gaze down from it. To be a Christian is to gaze up at a high mountain, the highest, in fact: In days to come, the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest mountain and raised above the hills (Is 2:2). This mountain dwarfs us. Solomon acknowledges to God, the highest heavens cannot contain you (1 Kgs 8:27). We are pebbles at the foot of Mount Everest. His greatness rises above us with a terrifying grandeur. God is always free to respond to our complaints with wisdom far above ours: Where were you when I founded the earth? (Jb 38:4). At the same time, however, his divine majesty frees us from being governed by the ups and downs of mood, health, circumstances, relationships, or any merely human metric. God is greater than our hearts and knows everything (1 Jn 3:20). The shadow of the mountain is not a bad place to be. But the Christian not only gazes up the holy mountain—he climbs it. He climbs it because it has been climbed before. Christ hiked the trail in both directions. He came down from the heights to meet us in the valley of the shadow of death. He then turned to lead our pilgrim way up Mount Calvary, transforming that grim summit into a revelation of Mount Zion. Christ is God's answer to the Psalmist's cry: I raise my eyes to the mountains. From whence shall come my help? My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth (Ps. 121:1-2). He came down to lead us up. Christians can begin each morning in hope because we hope for heaven. No smaller hope will do, no lesser pilgrimage will satisfy. It is no wonder that Saint Pier Giorgio Frassati's motto has touched so many hearts in our flat and despairing age: Verso l'alto! To the heights! As Pope Francis said when announcing this Jubilee year: "We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us." Yes, we will become dusty, tired, and fatigued. But as we look up, we see a man bathed in light standing on the summit, and we feel his strength in our limbs. Jesus made it to the top on our behalf as forerunner (Heb 6:20). We have every reason to hope: Come, let us go up to the Lord's mountain (Is 2:3). 
