EXALTATION OF THE HOLY CROSS

First Reading: Numbers 21:4b-9

The Jews were complaining against God and Moses of the tiring journey through the desert. The Lord punished them for such complaints with the bite of deadly serpents. After hearing the prayers of Moses for his people, the Lord instructed Moses to cure those who became ill with a bronze serpent mounted to a pole for them to see.

Second Reading: Philippians 2:6-11

In this letter to the Philippians, Paul tells us how Jesus set aside his form of equality to God and took on a humble, human form - obedient even unto death. God the Father greatly exalted Jesus because of this.

Gospel Reading: John 3:13-17

As today's first reading tells us of Moses raising the bronze serpent in the desert for those to be cured, Jesus says, too, that the Son of Man should be lifted up for all to see so the world might be saved and he who believes in him might enjoy eternal life.





Faith Formation News

Sept 14, 2025 - The Exaltation of the Cross

We celebrate the cross—an instrument of death—because by

it we pass from death to life. Jesus shows this by comparing His crucifixion to the bronze serpent. After Israel had sinned in the desert, God punished the people with deadly serpents. Yet when they repented and He showed them mercy, He did not take away the serpents. Instead, He erected an image of that punishment. If a bitten Israelite looked upon a bronze serpent, he would live. Similarly, Adam's sin and our personal sins merit death. But we fix our eyes on the crucified Lord who was "obedient unto death, even death on a cross." For "just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life."

I sat in the pew one morning not quite a decade ago. His family and his friends, those who would testify to the stories shared—we had gathered to bury him. He had lived life

well, loved the Lord, trusted in his faithfulness, and always, without hesitation, gave him all the glory. Even in our hope that he rested in the peace of our Lord, and in that holy and sacred space, our grief was great. As the procession began, my eyes followed the server as he delivered the cross to its place of honor, bowed ever so slightly, and made his way to his seat. The cross stood resolute, its polished gold and precious gem adornments inviting reflection, its majesty quietly calling gazes to ponder its mystery. It was beautiful, but I could not help but think of the cross of crude wood and rugged construction Jesus carried to Calvary, the one on which he would hang. Under its weight his knees buckled; its knots and splinters chafed skin already raw from the scourging. Marked by a rushed inscription, made in mockery, his cross stood testament to the malice of the embittered. I considered the anguish of those who had gathered at its foot in grief and confusion. Surely, they wondered how miracles could lead to mockery. And yet, they would soon understand its glory, its power, and its might. They would be the first to claim victory through the knotted and splintered cross on which he died that we might live. Amidst the juxtaposition of grief and joy, I set my gaze upon the cross lifted high on the altar. It would guide me, as it had led the procession on that solemn and sacred fall morning, to a place where the boundary between mourning and rejoicing blurred-and where it would lead us all to find solace in its promise at the table set before us.

victory of love over hatred, of generosity over selfishness, of peace over violence. Through Christ our crucified Lord. Amen.

FEAST DAYS celebrated this Month Sept 15, Monday - Our Lady of Sorrows

By the loving obedience He showed to the Father through his life, suffering, and death, Jesus showered us with grace so that we could share in His divine love. We do this by patterning our own lives after Christ's. Mary patterned her life after her Son's most especially when she stood beneath the cross as her Son hung dying. Her heart was united to His: His death was hers. When a lance pierced her Son's heart, her heart was pierced by a sword. Yet she who suffered her Son's death now shares most abundantly in his divine love and joy. Our mother invites us to stand by the cross with her so that we who share her sorrow may also share her joy.

"Mary, you have loved us so much! Give us just a little of your faith, a little of your hope and your love, your strength and perseverance, your humility and purity, your meekness and your mercy and all your

virtues. As often as we think of them, we understand how much


