THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Sirach 35:12-14, 16-18

God is just and does not show favoritism, but hears the prayers of everyone. Anyone who serves God, no matter how lowly his position here on earth, will be heard and answered.

Second Reading: 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18

Paul writes to Timothy that he thinks his mission is near the end, and he is glad his faith is still strong. Paul hopes that all nations will hear the gospel. But, if he is executed as he anticipates, he is sure he will live forever in heaven.

Gospel: Luke 18:9-14

Jesus tells a parable about a Pharisee who went to the temple, and offered up a prayer of thanks because he was not a sinner like the tax collector who was also there to pray. The tax collector was far more humble, acknowledging his sins, and asking forgiveness for them. Jesus said the tax collector's prayer would be heard because, "Everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, while he who humbles himself will be exalted."

"The one who serves God willingly is heard; his petition reaches the heavens. The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds, it does not rest till it reaches its goal, or will it withdraw till the Most High responds...and the Lord will not delay."

One of the most effective ways to begin prayer is to tell myself 'I am going to have a conversation with the Lord.' A conversation usually begins with a greeting and a willingness to listen, a two way street. The book of Sirach cited above encourages us as we begin our conversation. Am I convinced that the Lord is interested in my conversation? Do I believe He listens and responds as He sees fit? The Old Testament author cites the humble prayer of the widow and orphan and Jesus praises the prayer of the tax collector who prayed 'O God, be merciful to me a sinner.' Enjoy your conversation.

Oct 26, 2025 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Two people went up to the temple area to pray:" (Luke 18:10 The tax collector, completely aware of his unworthiness, beats his breast and prays, "O God, be

merciful to me a sinner." Where does he get the confidence to do this? His experience of limitation and failure has led him not to despair, but to depend. He remains certain that there is something beyond "every evil threat" and that the Lord will rescue him. Upsetting the apple carts of our expectations seems to be one of God's favorite activities. The Pharisee offers God his good deeds as a bribe, confident they will win him a rich reward. The tax collector offers only his sins, aware that they should earn him punishment. God rewards his repentance with mercy far more than sevenfold.

When a guardian angel brings hope in the darkest hour. A grieving widow's encounter with a nurse named Barbie revealed her guardian angel was closer than she ever imagined. Sometimes faith finds us in the most unimaginable moments — when life as we know it has shattered, and yet, somehow, a glimmer of light breaks through the grief. That's what happened to a Kansas mother who recently shared the story of her last night with her husband, Scott — a police officer who never came home from duty. Her post has moved thousands, not just for the tragedy it tells, but for the quiet miracle that unfolded amid the heartbreak. It began as an ordinary Saturday night. The family — Scott, his wife Elizabeth, and their two children, Patrick and Victoria were all

crammed together in bed.
They laughed, chatted about favorite foods and hard-to-spell words, and, unexpectedly, found themselves talking



about **their guardian angels**. It was a tender, light-hearted conversation that carried the easy joy of family life. The children described what their angels might look like. Little Victoria said hers had long red hair, "like Princess Merida." Elizabeth laughed and said hers was "classic Barbie — long blonde hair and fabulous in stilettos." Scott, ever the playful dad, decided his angel looked like Carl from *Up*, but with dark hair and

sunglasses. It was a simple, silly exchange — one that any parent would treasure. None of them could have imagined how sacred that moment would soon become. Only hours later, everything changed. Scott was fatally shot in the line of duty. A call for help to the guardian angel As his wife rushed to the hospital, she thought of what they'd talked about only the night before. In her panic and disbelief, she silently prayed — and, as she put it, "sent Barbie to be with Scott." When she arrived at the hospital, she learned the devastating news: Scott hadn't survived. Her world collapsed. She prayed over his body, wept, and told God she couldn't understand any of it. The pain was unfathomable. And then — in the kind of moment that feels both ordinary and extraordinary — a nurse approached her, concerned about the woman sitting on the cold hospital floor. "We're just checking on the lady down here," the nurse said gently. Through her tears, the grieving wife looked up and saw the nurse's name tag. It read: Barbie. In that instant, she said, she knew. Her guardian angel her Barbie — was back with her. And with that, a wave of peace, however small, washed over her. She wrote, "I know, without a doubt, that Scott is in heaven. And I found immediate comfort in that." God's presence in suffering It's easy to dismiss such things as coincidence. But faith has a way of opening our eyes to the sacred patterns woven through our ordinary lives. While it's true that God, not us, gives the names to our guardian angels, having a nickname for their guardian angles gave this family a language of love — a way to recognize God's presence in their suffering. Because sometimes, heaven speaks to us in precisely the words we'll understand. This mother's story reminds us of the extraordinary gift God gives each of us at birth: a guardian angel who never leaves our side. Whether we sense them or not, they are always near — whispering courage, carrying our prayers, and, in moments of great loss, bringing us the comfort we can hardly ask for. It's a quiet truth of faith: that even when life breaks our hearts, heaven never leaves us alone in the ruins. So perhaps tonight, as we say our prayers, we can take a moment to thank our guardian angels — those unseen companions who travel every step of this journey with us, often working in ways we only understand much later. Because one day, when we least expect it, they may just remind us — through a name tag, a voice, or a gentle nudge — that love, even though death, endures. Our prayers go out to Scott, Elizabeth, their young children. and their extended family and friends.
