#### THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

#### First Reading: Malachi 3:19-20a

The prophet Malachi warned that the time would come when all the evil people would be punished. He then speaks of the arrival of "the sun of justice, with its healing rays," believed by most to mean Jesus.

#### Second Reading: 2 Thessalonians 3:7-12

Some of the Thessalonians claimed Christ's return was imminent, so they stopped working and asked others for food. Paul describes his willingness to work, so that he would not impose on others. He encourages them to follow his example and earn their own living.

#### **Gospel: Luke 21:5-19**

Jesus warns of the persecution all Christians will face because of him, and how some will even be put to death. Yet he says they will not be harmed because "by patient endurance you will save your lives." If Jesus' followers are loyal, they will be resurrected and their suffering

## OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE

"As they approached to offer him wine they called out 'If you are king of the Jews, save yourself' Above him there was the inscription that read, 'This is the King of the Jews'... 'Jesus remember me when you come into your kingdom.' He replied to him, 'Amen I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise.'"

From the earliest gospel teaching we heard Jesus speak of the kingdom. The parables offered us countless examples of what the kingdom is like. As we stand at the cross on Calvary today, we honor the king and identify as members of His kingdom. How often people when viewing a crucifix ask, 'what does INRI mean?'. The gospel text tells us Who it is hanging there in order to save us. Like the repentant thief, we ask that He remember us today, and yearn to hear Him say, 'I assure you, today you will be with me in paradise.'

Faith Formation News

#### Nov 23, 2025 Christ the King

"Above him there was an inscription that read, 'This is the King of the Jews.'"

In the crucified Jesus the divinity is disfigured, stripped of all visible glory, and yet is present and real. Faith alone can recognize it: the faith of Mary, who places in her heart too this last scene in the mosaic of her Son's life. She does not yet see the whole, but continues to trust in God, repeating once again with the same abandonment: Behold the handmaid of the Lord. Then there is the faith of the Good Thief: a faith barely outlined but sufficient to assure him salvation: Today you will be with me in Paradise. This "with me" is crucial. Yes, it is this that saves him. Of course, the Good Thief is on the cross like Jesus, but above all he is on the cross with Jesus. And, unlike the other evildoer and all those who taunt him, he does not ask Jesus to come down from the cross nor to make him come down. Instead he says: Remember me when you come into your kingdom. The Good Thief sees Jesus on the cross, disfigured and unrecognizable, and yet he entrusts himself to him as to a king, indeed as to the King. The Good Thief believes what was written on the tablet over Jesus' head: The King of the Jews. He believed and entrusted himself. For this reason he was already, immediately, in the "today" of God, in Paradise, because Paradise is this: being with Jesus, being with God. So here is the first and fundamental message that the word of God clearly tells us today.... It calls us to be with Jesus, like Mary, and not to ask him to come down from the cross but rather to stay there with him.... We know from the Gospels that the cross was the critical point of the faith of Simon Peter and of the other apostles.... They could not tolerate the idea of a crucified Messiah. Peter's "conversion" is fully achieved when he stops wanting "to save" Jesus and accepts to be saved by him....This is what our joy is: participating, in the Church, in the fullness of Christ through the obedience of the cross, of being qualified to share in the inheritance of the saints in light, of being "transferred" to the kingdom of the Son of God (see Col 1:12-13). For this reason we live in perennial thanksgiving, and even in trials do not lack the joy and peace that Christ bequeathed to us as a guarantee of his kingdom which already exists among us, who wait with faith and hope, and of which we have a foretaste in love. #### Jubilee 2025: PILGRIMS of HOPE



#### 247 The MOTIVE For HOPE

Part 2: The certitude of our HOPE is derived from the certitude of our faith. "For I know whom I have believed," says St. Paul, "and I am certain that He is able to keep that which I have committed unto Him

against that day" (2 Tm 1,12), that is, unto life eternal. This certitude is not of the intellect, but rather of the will and the heart; it is the certitude which gives us full confidence in someone who we know loves us. And who loves us more than God? Who has given us more proofs of His love than God? Let us look at **Jesus on the Cross** and repeat with St. Paul: "The Son of God...loved me and delivered Himself for me"

(Gal 2,20). Now "greater love than this, no man hath, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (Jn 15,13). This is the basis for the certitude of our HOPE. We must HOPE to come to the beatifying possession of God in eternity and to union with Him on this earth, not so much because we have always done our duty, or because we feel we are good, virtuous, and well-disposed...but because we know that in spite of our misery and our weakness, God is always ready to help us, provided we humbly acknowledge our nothingness and place all our trust in Him. St. Teresa of the Child Jesus said: "Holiness does not consist of this or that practice; it consists in a disposition of heart which makes us humble and little in the arms of God, well aware of our feebleness, but boldly confident in our Father's goodness" (T.CJ. NV). If we withdraw into ourselves after our falls and weaknesses, we clip the wings of HOPE and only sink more deeply in our misery; but if, on the contrary, we go to God in an act of complete confidence, then our weakness will be fortified and sustained by His helping omnipotence. If, in the face of difficulties and sacrifices imposed on us by our duties, we stop to calculate our strength, we will draw back and be tempted to give up; but if, on the contrary, we stop looking at ourselves and turn our eyes to God, to His infinite love, the certitude of His help will give us the strength to go on. Firm HOPE in Him will make us strong, courageous, and generous; it will be the lever of our life. The Jubilee Year of HOPE will end January 6, 2026, the Solemnity of the Epiphany. There is still time to receive the special blessings and indulgences that are available to the faithful. For the next few months, there will be reflections of HOPE in the bulletin. Take advantage of this special Grace we have been given in being Pilgrims of Hope.(All excerpts/reflections
