THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

First Reading: Isaiah 35:1-6a, 10

Isaiah tells us that when Christ comes, the weak will be made strong, the deaf will hear, the blind will see, and, above all, "sorrow and mourning will flee."

Second Reading: James 5:7-10

As the farmer waits patiently through winter and spring for the "yield of the soil" so, too, must we wait patiently for the coming of the Messiah.

Gospel: Matthew 11:2-11

While in prison, John sends a messenger to Jesus to ask, "Are you He who is to come or do we look for another?" Jesus replies by citing the miracles he has performed for the blind, the deaf, and the crippled. He concludes by identifying John as the messenger He has sent to prepare the way.

Faith Formation News Dec. 14, 2025 3rd Sunday of ADVENT Year A

"Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?"

Awaiting the One to Come

Let us prepare for Christ in our hearts a dwelling full of patient merits; let us prepare a crib, a cradle brilliant with the flowers of a good life and the perpetual sweetness of its fragrance. Let us receive the tiny little Lord in our hearts; may he grow and make progress there, nourished by faith, may he ascend to youth there on the steps of life, and may he exercise the powers which are mentioned in the Gospel. Within us the Lord has a blind man to whom he can give light, a lame man whose step he can restore and bring to the path of truth without stumbling.... What he did in those who were dead he does in the living. He raises a man to life in the room of his heart....By those other resurrections which were accomplished for our hope, the Lord promises that he will restore life to all who desire to rise again.... He became man so that man whom he had created might not perish; he suffered cruel torments in order that he might free the unworthy from deserving punishments. He hung on the tree of death in order to expiate the fault which was derived from the tree through disobedience.... Christ was born in order that he might suffer, he suffered in order that he might die, he died in order that he might descend into hell, he descended there in order that he might free the dead.... The Way came to those who were wandering, the Judge came to the guilty, the Physician came to those who were sick, Life came to the dead....O Lord, with what joy and exultation shall we describe the benefits of such great goodness? What more is there that we who are sick might ask than what you have offered of your own accord to those who did not deserve it?... Therefore, let us love our price and let us make ourselves worthy of it by good deeds and right actions.... A Father's Blessing

Simple Gifts "Daddy, I made this for you." There is nothing quite like getting a handmade gift from one of your children. The most common gift my children like to give is artwork—everything from colorful scribbles to detailed sketches, depending on their age and skill level. Before I became a father, I never could have fathomed the heartwarming joy that would come from such a gift. Even those scribbled-on scraps that would have been thrown away had I not been in the room are, to me, suitable for framing or tacking to the fridge and cherishing forever.

I like to think that Our Lord feels the same way about his own children. Many of us try and try to do God's will, and to give him of ourselves, but what we have to offer him is wildly imperfect. Often it seems that all we can give is the spiritual equivalent of scribbled-on paper scraps. But God is happy to receive even these, if they are born of a loving heart. He wants

us to give ourselves completely over to him, for our own good, but he looks on us and our gifts with the kindness and love of a true Father. Jubilee 2025: PILGRIMS of HOPE 248: THE TEST OF HOPE



Presence of God - Give me, O Lord, invincible HOPE; teach me to HOPE against all HOPE, teach me to HOPE with all my strength.

Part 2. The least act of hope, of trust in God, made in the midst of trials, in a state of interior or exterior

desolation, is worth far more than a thousand acts made in times of joy and prosperity. When we are suffering in mind or body, when we are experiencing the void of abandonment and helplessness, when we find ourselves a prey to the repugnance's and rebellions of nature which would like to throw off the yoke of the Lord, we cannot pretend to have the comforting feeling of hope, of confidence; often we may even experience the opposite sentiment, and yet, even in this state we can make acts of hope and of confidence which are not felt but willed. The theological virtues are practiced essentially by the will. When they are accompanied by feeling, the practice of them is pleasant and consoling; but when the act must be made by the will alone, then this exercise is dry and cold, but is not for this reason of less merit; on the contrary, it is even more meritorious and therefore gives more glory to God. We should not, therefore, be disturbed if we do not FEEL confidence; we must WILL to have confidence, WILL to hope, to hope at any cost, in spite of all the blows God may inflict on us by means of trials. This is the moment to repeat with Job: "Although He should kill me, I will trust in Him" (Jb 13:15). We must not deceive ourselves, thinking we can go through these trials without having to fight against discouragement, against temptations to distrust, and perhaps even to despair; this is the reaction of nature which rebels against that which wounds it. The Lord knows our weakness; He3 does not condemn us, He pities su. These feelings do not offend God, provided we always try to react gently by making acts of confidence with our will. Every time a wave of discouragement tries to carry us away, we must react against it by anchoring ourselves in God by a simple movement of trust; even if our spiritual life should be reduced, for certain periods, to this exercise alone, we will not have lost anything, but we will have gained much. It is precisely by going through these trials that we reach the heroic practice of faith and hope; and the heroism of the virtues is necessary for the attainment of
