SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Sirach 15:15-20

This passage from Sirach gives strong, unequivocal emphasis to free will in every person. Before each of us is set, sin or virtue, life or death, and each of us are free to choose the one or the other.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 2:6-10

Paul explains to the Corinthians that there are two different kinds of wisdom — the wisdom of God and the wisdom of the world. The wisdom of God is mysterious, but this wisdom has been revealed “to those who love him” through the Spirit.

Gospel: Matthew 5:17-37

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus tells the people he has come to fulfill the law. He speaks strongly against murder and anger, against adultery and lust, and against false oaths and lies. He warns the people that unless their virtue exceeds that of the Pharisees, they “will not enter the kingdom of God.”

"If you choose you can keep the commandments, they will save you; if you trust in God you too shall live... Before you are life and death, good and evil, whichever he chooses shall be given him, immense is the wisdom of the Lord, he is mighty in power and all seeing. The eyes of the Lord are on those who fear him, he understands man's every deed."

How many choices we make every day. Many times, we are not even aware of choosing one thing over another. We decide, period. But there are things of value and great importance which require thought and careful consideration. How do I know the difference?

There are life giving decisions, important family matters, the common good or well-being of others, which tell us, slow down, what are the consequences before you make a rash move. The author tells us to make right and deliberate choices. The phrase 'what would Jesus do?' is a point well taken, or as Sirach state 'if you trust in God, you too shall live.' 'Jesus I trust in you.'

The Fourth Degree Knights will be collecting personal care items for Veterans until March 1st. Boxes are available in the vestibule for your donation.




Faith Formation News

February 15, 2026
The 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Everyone desires to be happy," teaches Saint Thomas Aquinas. Here, Jesus lays out his program for happiness, as indicated by the recurring word *makarios*, which is Greek for "blessed" or simply "happy." Yet the picture Jesus paints appears rather grotesque at first glance. He endorses everything our instincts tell us to avoid at all costs: poverty, hunger, tears, rejection. Why? Is it because money, wealth, merriment, and esteem are bad in themselves? No: on the contrary, these are good things. At the same time, there is a danger that we might become so distracted by the gifts that we forget the Giver. Saint Gregory the Great warns that if the prosperous are not careful, they may "love their pilgrimage more than their homeland and...transform the supplies for their journey into an impediment for their arrival." Sufferings borne well, on the other hand, can increase our desire for heaven and help prepare us to receive the joy that is to come. Saint John Paul II points out that the Beatitudes "are a sort of self-portrait of Christ and for this very reason are invitations to discipleship and to communion of life with Christ." In other words, Jesus practices what he preaches—or better, he preaches what he practices. Blessed are you who are poor is not spoken by an overindulgent tycoon but by Him who for our sake "became poor although he was rich" (2 Cor 8:9). Blessed are you when people hate you falls from the lips of one who will be betrayed, mocked, and executed. Our Lord "was spurned and avoided by men, a man of suffering, knowing pain" (Is 53:3). As Christians, we say that we want to follow Jesus and to be like Him, but are we ready to embrace the difficult truth that imitating Christ means being acquainted with suffering? (Lectio Devina) *Almighty Father, help me to listen to the words of your Son and imitate him in all that I do. May I draw closer to you on earth and, after this exile, behold you forever in heaven. Amen.*

Feast of the Chair of St. PETER, Feb 22

The Grace of the Chair of Peter




At the center of all Catholic doctrine, liturgy, morality, and prayer is the person of Jesus.... He has reconciled us with the Father, establishing peace through the blood of His cross (Col 1:20).... Salvation and sonship—these are what Jesus won for us. Yet these gifts must still be extended throughout the world and throughout history. He desires that every soul encounter Him, that He be formed in every soul.... When Jesus ascended into heaven, He did not leave behind a book, or even instructions to write a book. Rather, He left behind a hierarchical community of believers, His Church. And He established this not as a merely human organization but as His abiding presence in the world—as His Body animated by his Spirit....To accomplish her mission of forming Christ in souls, the Church must possess the

means to do so. And so she does, most notably the authority to teach Christ's truth and communicate His grace. The Church teaches authoritatively what to believe (doctrine) and how to live (morals). This authority, so often seen as a threat to human freedom, in fact answers the longings of the human heart. We all want to know what is true and to do what is right. Uncertainty, not a teaching authority, is the enemy of human freedom. As long as we are uncertain, we will not give ourselves generously. We remain enslaved in doubt. Confidence in the truth about Jesus and His narrow path frees us to run that path joyfully. The Church teaches authoritatively the truth that sets us free (cf. Jn 8:32). But to know the truth is not enough. Since we remain weak and ignorant, we need Christ's grace to strengthen and enlighten us. Thus the Church administers the sacraments to her members, to bring them divine life, to nourish them, and to heal them when necessary.... These means of grace, entrusted to the Church for the salvation of souls, have as their ultimate purpose the formation of Christ within us. Who do you say that I am? Jesus put this question to His apostles, and it echoes throughout history. It is, in the end, the only question that matters. The Catholic Church exists, ultimately, as a living response to that question and to form the response in every soul: You are the Christ, the Son of the living God. (*Father Scalia is a priest in the diocese of Arlington, Virginia, where he serves as Episcopal Vicar for Clergy and the pastor*)

MADE FOR HEAVEN






